# I Will Give You a New Heart and Put a New Spirit in You



# Moving from Death to New Life during the Lockdown

A whole year has passed by and we are just recovering from the deadly effects of Covid-19. We are grateful to God that a year ago, we, the staff of St. Theresa's School, Haregaon, had ventured out to visit Sophia College, Mumbai, and we all joyfully returned safely, before the Lockdown quarantined all of us in our own homes. For the sake of the education of the children, St. Theresa's School continued our teaching programme, till the Government declared all schools closed for the safety of the children. We contacted the parents of our hostel girls – to please come and to take their daughters home. A death-like silence and sadness descended upon all of us at Haregaon.

Depressing news poured in from every part of the country and from every other country. Everyone was struggling to understand this new pandemic, which was causing much suffering among all classes of people with many deaths. Fear gripped the hearts of migrant workers as they faced unemployment and starvation. In the absence of transport, many walked miles with their families to reach the safety of their village homes and suffered much along the way.



To overcome the depression that was coming over us, Sr. Valeria and I began some life-giving activities. We struggled to dig up our garden soil and prepared the land to plant vegetables like methi, karela, ladies' fingers, brinjal, and so on. The work was hard but the fruits gave us great joy. Harmony with Nature blessed us with new life and gave new meaning to our lives.

Mass began to be celebrated in the Parish Church only for the Fathers and the Sisters. In the absence of people, I was inspired to learn to do the

Marathi Reading and to conduct the Marathi singing. Sr. Jyoti was a patient and encouraging guide. The Holy Spirit filled me with confidence to conduct the Marathi Choir all by myself even in the absence of Jyoti.

Working a little extra, doing something new, brought newness into my religious life. I learnt a few new Marathi hymns. I cooked some new foods and tried out new recipes. I accompanied and collaborated with Sr. Jyoti in the new out-reach programmes.
